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Expectations from the TDA Masters in Teaching and Learning project

CUREE is working with the Training and Development Agency for Schools (TDA) on developing the Masters in Teaching and Learning (MTL) programme.

Have you heard about the Government's new ambitions to make ready a Masters level progression? Are you wondering how the development of an entitlement to a Masters in teaching and learning (MTL) might relate to the evidence base and affect existing CPD? If so, CUREE's work to support TDA in developing MTL will be of direct interest.

CUREE is supporting TDA's work by:

- synthesising the evidence describing what is known about developing coaching capacity which will support professional learning at Masters level;
- facilitating two symposia, aimed at building a shared understanding amongst the stakeholders of what is meant by work based professional learning and the role of coaching in supporting it;
- illustrating the evidence relating to work based professional learning and coaching with relevant case studies;
- developing a set of principles for professional learning that will underpin the coaching process in MTL; and
- designing a specification of the programme for training coaches.





Building the Evidence Base Literature Review

The map of research reviews, which was completed in January 2008, highlighted six key findings which had a strong resonance with the claims QCA had made that underpinned the secondary curriculum. So it was decided to concentrate the remaining review work on extracting data from the individual studies underpinning the review in order to illustrate the abstract findings from the map with practical details. We also wanted to try and illustrate further QCA's curriculum claims.

The full report was completed in August 2008. It creates a substantial reference point or archive of illustrative material, provides a profile of the maturity of the evidence base in many key areas and offers an important springboard for further research and development.
