The role of specialists in teachers' professional development

The latest systematic research review from the CUREE led CPD Review Group explores the skills that specialists deploy to ensure successful teacher learning. The reviewers found that effective specialists not only introduced the teachers to new knowledge, they supported teachers to use it to develop their skills and make changes to their practice. Specialists promoted teachers' understanding of how they might use their new knowledge in practice in a number of ways, which included:

- modeling the new ideas in a classroom setting
- supporting the teachers to make changes through sustained mentoring and coaching, and
- helping teachers to collaborate with, and support one another.

When supported by specialists in this way, teachers learned more about new ways of teaching their subject, and pupil learning, which in turn helped them to enhance their pupils' engagement, confidence, attitudes, and achievement. Transferring learning and taking innovation to scale



What are the usual approaches to transferring learning and taking it to scale and what is known about their effectiveness?

The outcomes of a year long project looking at the processes and issues around transferring good practice and taking it to scale are available in a recently published pamphlet written by CUREE for the Innovation Unit. The findings were informed by an analysis of the evidence base, national and regional consultation, and seven case studies.

As well as reflecting on what is currently known about transferring practice and going to scale, the pamphlet, and accompanying seminar and case study reports, set out a series of questions to provoke thinking and debate. The reports cover key issues decision makers face, such
